I Abithor Evans of Pawlet in the County
of Rutland & State of Vermont in the twenty
sixth year of my age depose & declare that
I served in the cause of Independence from
Lexington ~~to~~ till the Month of March
A. 1777 at which time I enlisted into the
Com. commanded by Capt. David Parsons in
Col. Charles Miles Reg. during the continuation
of the War to fight against the common
Enemy & soon after obtained a Sergeants
Vermont Com. line & served faithfully till
as Sergeant till Peace was proclaimed & did not
receive my discharge till the Month of
June A. 1784 having ^{served} over year more
than my term of enlistment.

My discharge has been lost for many
years. —

I furthermore depose & say that I own
and hold to state of extreme indignation &
stand in passing need of assistance from
my Country for support. —

Done at Pawlet in the County &
State as above this 17th day of April
A. 1815. — Abithor Evans

On this Fourth — day of May
in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and
thirty seven, before the Honorable Almon Warner, Judge
of the Probate Court within and for the District of
Fairhaven in said County, Mary Evans, a resident of
of Pawlet in said County, and within the said Probate
District, aged 93 years, who being first duly sworn
according to law, doth on her oath make the following
declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the provision
made by the act of Congress passed July 4, 1836:

That she is the widow of Abraham Evans, late of Pawlet
aforesaid, deceased, who was a Sergeant in the Connecticut Line
of the Army of the Revolution; the proof of whose services
is contained in his original declaration and accompanying
documentary evidence therewith transmitted and now remaining
in the War Office of the United States, and upon which
declaration and documentary evidence a pension amounting
to 96 dollars per annum, commencing on the 17th day of April
1818, was granted to the said Abraham Evans on the 8th
day of March, 1819, agreeably to the provisions of the act of
Congress passed the 18th day of March, 1818, entitled: "an act
to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval
services of the United States in the Revolutionary War;" and
that she doth hereby refer to the said Abraham Evans'
original declaration aforesaid with his said proofs and
documentary evidence, as well as to the proofs accompanying
this

this former declaration, for substantiating her claim aforesaid.
She further declares, that she was married to the said
Abraham Evans on the 10th day of February, seventeen
hundred and fifty six, and that her husband, the aforesaid
Abraham Evans died on the 10th day of July, 1831, and
that she has remained a widow ever since that period, as
will more fully appear by reference to the proof hereto
annexed.

Dear Sir:

The data furnished herein were obtained from papers on file in pension claim, W. 21080, based upon the service of Abiather Evans in the War of the Revolution.

The date and place of birth of Abiather Evans were not shown, nor were the names of his parents stated.

While a resident of Windsor, Hartford County, Connecticut, Abiather Evans served from the beginning of the battle of Lexington until sometime in March, 1777, names of officers and details of this service not given. He enlisted sometime in March, 1777, served as private in Captain David Parsons' company, Colonel Charles Webb's Second Connecticut Regiment, he was appointed, May 1, 1780, sergeant in said regiment, and served in Colonel Samuel B. Webb's Connecticut Regiment, and was discharged in the month of June, 1783, or 1784.

He was allowed pension on his application executed April 17, 1818, at which time he was in the seventy-sixth year of his age, and living in Pawlet, Rutland County, Vermont.

In 1820, he was referred to as Abiather Evans, Senior. He died July 10, 1831 in Pawlet, Vermont.

Abiather Evans married November 10, 1786, Mary Johnson; their marriage was recorded on the books of

the Congregational Church in Tyringham, Berkshire
County, Massachusetts.

His widow, Mary Evans, was allowed pension on
her application executed May 4, 1837, then aged ninety-
three years, and living in Pawlet, Vermont. She died
there August 23, 1847. The names of her parents were
not given.

Abiather Evans and his wife, Mary, had five
children, three daughters and two sons; the only
surviving child in 1858 was a daughter, whose residence
was in "parts unknown". In 1858, Wealthy Parsons of
Elkhart County, Indiana, stated that Abiather Evans'
eldest son, Frederick Evans, then deceased left a widow
and children; names of his wife and children were not
shown, and the names of the other children of Abiather
Evans and his wife, Mary, were not stated.
