STATE OF NEW-HAMPSHIRE.

Grafton ss.)

ON this fourth — day of June — 1818, before me the subscriber, one of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas for said County personally appears Jonathan Ferrin

aged 64 — years, resident in Thornton in the said State, who being by me first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war." That he the said Jon. Ferrin enlisted in Field or March 1776 at Cambridge in the State of Massachusetts in the company commanded by Captain Shearman of the Regiment commanded by Col. Baldwin in Genl. Greene's Brigade ; that he continued to serve in the said corps, or in the service of the United States, until the month of Feb, or March 1777. , when he was discharged from service in Peckskill

State of New York ; that he was in the battles of Long Island, White-Plains & two at Saratoga and that he is in reduced circumstances, and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support ; and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said services.

Sworn to and declared before me, the day and year aforesaid.

I, Ezra Bartlett, Judge of the Court of Common Pleas — as aforesaid, do certify, that it appears to my satisfaction, that the said Jon. Ferrin is in indigent circumstances stands in need of assistance for support & did serve in the revolutionary war, as stated in the preceding declaration, against the common enemy ; and I now transmit the proceedings and testimony taken and had before me, to the Secretary for the Department of War, pursuant to the directions of the aforementioned act of Congress.

Declaration

In order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress of 7th of July
1838 intitled "An act granting half pay and pensions to certain Widows
of the State of New Hampshire" /

On this eighteenth day of September in the year eighteen hundred
and thirty eight personally appeared before me Walter Blair
one of the Justices of the Court of Common Pleas in said County
of Grafton Hannah Ferrin resident of Thornton in the County of
Grafton aged seventy seven years who being first duly sworn
according to law doth on her oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefits of the provision made by the act
of Congress passed July 7. 1838 intitled "An act granting half
pay and pensions to certain Widows." That she is the widow
of Jonathan Ferrin the identical person named in the
accompanying certificate who was a private in the Army
of the Revolution and was at Peaseous in the pension list of
the New Hampshire Agency at the rate of eight dollars per
month as appears by said certificate
She further declares that she was married to the said Jonathan
Ferrin at Hampton in said State on the thirteenth day of
December seventeen hundred and eighty one that her
husband the aforesaid Jonathan Ferrin died on the thirtieth
day of June in the year eighteen hundred and twenty four
that she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service
but the marriage took place previous to the first of
January seventeen hundred and eighty four

At the time before stated
I am well acquainted with Hannah Ferrin
and do hereby declare on my oaths
the day and year above written before me this 1st day
of December 1859 and doth make and declare
and swear the same under my hand and seal
The above named Hannah Ferrin
being infirm and unable to attend
in Court this declaration was taken
at her residence

I Jonathan Ferrin of Thornton in the County of Grafton & State of New Hampshire of lawful age depose and say that I am the son of Jonathan Ferrin late of said Thornton deceased who was a pensioner and the identical person named in the certificate annexed which entitles him to draw a pension. I further say that said Jonathan Ferrin died on the thirtieth day of June eighteen hundred and twenty seven. I further say that Hannah Ferrin the person named in the annexed declaration is the widow of said Jonathan having never married since his decease.

Dear Sir:

You are advised that it appears from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, F. 14000, that Jonathan Journeay, enlisted from Duxbury, New Hampshire, served eight months in 1776, dates not given, in Captain Isaac Sherman's company, in Colonel Lowell Baldwin's Massachusetts regiment, and was in the battle of Bunker Hill. He enlisted in February or March, 1776, at Cambridge, Massachusetts, and served one year as private in Captain Isaac Sherman's and Caleb Robinson's companies. Colonel Lowell Baldwin's Massachusetts regiment, was in the battles of Long Island and White Plains. He enlisted in May, 1777, and served eight or nine months as private in Captain Benjamin Stone's company, Colonel Alexander Scamell's New Hampshire regiment, was in both battles of Saratoga and during this enlistment he received a wound in his knee and was furloughed for sixty days.

He was allowed pension on his application executed June 4, 1818, while a resident of Thornton, Grafton County, New Hampshire, aged sixty-four years.

He died June 30, 1837.

Soldier married December 13, 1781, in Exeter, Rockingham County, New Hampshire, Hannah Hale.

She was allowed pension on her application executed September 10, 1837, at which time she was living in Exeter, New Hampshire, aged seventy-seven years.

In 1818, one Maria Farin was living in Exeter, Rockingham County, New Hampshire; relationship to soldier not shown.

In 1840, Jonathan Perrin, soldier's son, aged forty years, was living in Thornton, New Hampshire; and in 1850, Micah Perrin, another son of soldier, was living in Holland, Vermont. There is no further reference to children.

The citations in your letter of July 10, 1931, relative to Jonathan Perrin, pertain to the same man whose history is furnished you herein.
