On this sixth day of February A.D. 1834 personally appeared before the Court of Common Pleas now sitting at Providence within and for the County of Providence, Hebelon Devin now residing in Smithfield in the County of Providence and State aforesaid, aged seventy three years who being first duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832 To the interrogatories proposed by the War Department he answers as follows.

1<sup>st</sup> I was born in the town of Sand town in the State of New Hampshire in the month of February 1761.

2<sup>nd</sup> I have no record of my age.

3<sup>rd</sup> I was living in the town of Suffield, County of Hartford & State of Connecticut - have lived since the Revolutionary war in the town of Newport, County of <sup>Providence</sup> the State of New Hampshire & part of the time in the town of Smithfield where County of Providence, State of Rhode Island, where I now reside.

4<sup>th</sup> The first month I served I was drafted - the last six months I enlisted in

5<sup>th</sup> Captain Nathan Noble commanded the Company in my first months service & Col. Elize Hunt the Regiment - The other term of six months I served in a Company called Col. Starrs Company, commanded by Lieutenant Tiffany & Regiment of Col. Starr -

6<sup>th</sup> I received a discharge but am now unable to find it - do not recollect by whom it was signed -  
7<sup>th</sup> My neighbors are Joseph M. Brown & Isaac Green

This Depoant further saith that in the latter part of August A. D. 1779. He resided in the Town of Suffield County of Hartford & State of Connecticut & belonged to the Militia Company in said Town commanded by Captain Nathaniel Pomroy of said Suffield and was drafted from said Company to perform a Tour of duty of one month on the Coast near Long Island Sounds and joined the Company of Capt. Nathani Noble in the Regiment commanded by Col. Luke Went. I went to New-Haven & East-Haven & having served out the time for which I was drafted, was Honorably discharged. In the month of May of 1780 I together with Silas Dewey & Ethan ~~Brook~~ <sup>Smith</sup> enlisted at said Suffield under an order issued to said Capt. Nathaniel Pomroy to furnish three men for the Continental Service. I enlisted for six months in what was then called the "Short Levy". We went to Hartford with the said Capt. Pomroy to the Recruiting office where we passed Muster and joined a Company. From thence we marched through the Towns of Farmington, Danbury & other Towns not recollectea by this Declarant to Nelsons Point in the State of New York nearly opposite West Point. The Company while marching from said Hartford to Nelsons Point was commanded by a Continental officer whose name this Depoant hath forgotten. When the Company arrived at Nelsons Point I joined a Company called Col. Stars company commanded by Lieutenant Tiffany in the Regiment commanded by Col. Starr and served in said Company & Regiment six months. During that time we marched to a place called Kings Ferry where we crossed the Hudson River from thence to Orange Town in New Jersey. From Orange town we marched to a place called "Soldiers Fortune" I think in the Highlands, so called, of New York where I was Honorably discharged.
