State of New York

County of Putnam &c. On this 11th day of September in the year 1832 personally appeared before the court of common pleas of the said county of Putnam John Russell a resident of the town of Kent in the county of Putnam and state of New York aged seventy six years, who being first duly sworn according to law sath and his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of congress passed June 7. 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated, on or about the first of May in the year 1776 he was enlisted by Lieutenant Joshua Bassett in what is now the town of Carmel in Putmans County & State of New York then called Fredericksburgh, that he immediately after his enlistment he went with Gen^l Washington to Fort Constitution situated on the east side of Hudson river where he was put under the charge of Capt Stoen who was the captain of the company in which he was enlisted, the term of service for which he enlisted was four months he performed his duty as a soldier for the said four months at Fort Constitution, that immediately after the expiration of his term of service in Capt Stoen's company & about the first of Octo 1776 in said Fredericksburgh he enlisted in a company of rangers commanded by Capt Joshua Elyreks for the period of six months, & immediately after such enlistment he went with said Capt Elyreks company to Fishkill & remained there in the service until the next spring a period rather more than six months, on or about the first day of May 1777 he again enlisted under Capt Elijah Parsons for the period of three months, the company immediately after said enlistment went to the Red Mills, to guard the continental stores, they continued in the service there for the said three months, that soon after the expiration of said three months he enlisted under Capt Comfort Lexington in the month of August 1777 for three months that he performed this service along the bank of Hudson river, to keep the enemy from landing & making incursions into the country He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present & dollars that his name is not on the pension

roll of the army of any state

He further declares on his oath affirmed that he was born in the town of Bedford in the County of Westchester & State of New York, That he has no record of his age, that when he first enlisted he had well his Father in the town of Fredericksburgh deceased, and since the revolutionary war he has continued to live on the same farm which his father occupied when he first enlisted, that he volunteered in all his engagements except and in each case served for himself except when he served at the Red Mills under Capt Elyah Townsend for three months; that service was performed as a substitute for Andrew Rappidge.

This service was to guard the continental stores, & there was no officer in charge higher than that of captain, the ammunition for the company was drawn from Peekskill where Gen. Putnam commanded. That he cannot remember whether he ever received any discharge from the service.

That Isaac Drew of the Town of Kent in Putnam County was in the service of the revolution with the company for six months at ~~Redfield~~ ^{in open Court & absent & sworn before me John Russell} ~~Redfield~~ ^{his}. That Jacob Berry of the Town of Kent formerly served with this company three months at the Red Mills which is stated in the preceding deposition

Putnam County's Isaac Drew of the Town of Kent in the County of Putnam being duly sworn deposes say that he was acquainted well with Russell who has signed the preceding deposition in the revolutionary war that this deponent was in the service of the United States during said war in the same company with the said John Russell, commanded by Joshua Myrick. that the said Russell served as a soldier in said company for six months in the town of Redfield in Dutchess county, this service was in the year 1776.
